



We have reached 450 majestic trees submitted! We are making progress towards our Last 6000 Campaign goal of 1000 majestic trees by the month of October. We want to thank the many volunteers who have submitted majestic trees. We also want to recognize the seventeen people who have individually submitted more than five majestic trees. Thank you so much!

If everyone who has submitted majestic trees sends in two more, we can meet our initial goal for our tree "census". **Remember that knowing the tree species or specific diameter is not required to document a majestic tree.** You can just note that it is either Evergreen or Deciduous and that it is 30 inches or larger in diameter at breast height (DBH) per your estimation.

We have enjoyed photos of people in front of the majestic trees submitted and we want to highlight a selection below.





We have had over 40 people attend our three Big Tree Identification classes at Magnuson Park, in the Central District, and in Columbia City. We want to recognize Lucy who was the youngest person so far to attend one of our classes. She was awarded her own Urban Tree Identification book to use on her outings. She is standing in front of a majestic Deodar Cedar in Columbia City. The Deodar Cedar has its origins in the Himalayas and is referred to there as the “Tree of the Gods”. It is one of the tallest trees in the world. Seattle has the most Deodar Cedars of any city.

We are planning some group outings to document majestic trees in Beacon Hill, the Central District, Greenwood and West Seattle during the months of August and September.
